## Redivus scores one of 11 spots in Germany-based global accelerator

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Dr. Jeff Dunn followed the advice he often shares with others, and it paid off big: “Don’t ever turn down an introduction because you never know where it will lead to.”

One such introduction led to his Olathe startup, Redivus Health, being accepted into a 12-week global accelerator based in Munich, Germany. Redivus was one of only 11 startups chosen for the newest cohort, which includes companies from eight countries.

Katrin Bridges, an executive with the Greater Topeka Partnership, introduced Dunn to California-based Plug and Play, a venture capital investor that also operates multiple accelerator programs. One of those is Germany-based Startup Creasphere, which aims to drive innovation in health care by matching startups with big-wig companies for pilot projects.

Through Startup Creasphere, Redivus now is working closely with global pharmaceutical and diagnostics company Roche Diagnostics. The company employs more than 97,000 people, and 32 of its medicines are listed on the World Health Organization’s Model List of Essential Medicines. The collaboration with Roche could be game-changing, Redivus co-founder Dunn said.

The Code Blue portion of Redivus Health's app guides doctors and nurses through time-sensitive decision-making while caring for cardiac arrest patients. Redivus' technology also includes decision-making apps for sepsis and stroke.

The company is helping Redivus automate and improve its sepsis decision-making medical app, which gives health care providers “turn-by-turn navigation” for making time-sensitive decisions while caring for patients. They plan to build out additional artificial intelligence capabilities, which could include evaluating a patient’s chart and identifying abnormal data points. The Redivus app then could send a notification to providers on site that the patient is at high risk for sepsis and should be evaluated.

“Ultimately, our goal is to sign a partnership with Roche after this,” Dunn said.

The new relationship could help Redivus launch its app in more hospitals, including those outside the U.S. Dunn said going international would be a “dream come true.”

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
